Meet Dr. Celia Williamson

- Delivered over 200 presentations in human trafficking and social justice
- **Delivered** keynotes at more than 30 conferences
- Completed numerous studies, 49 peer-reviewed articles and government reports, and edited two books on sex trafficking
- Wrote four books: A Seat at the Table: The Courage to Care About Trafficking, The Survivor's Journey book and workbook, Effective Case Management with Human Trafficking Survivors, and Best Life Human Trafficking Prevention for Girls at Risk.
- Taught thousands of students to become skilled and knowledgeable change makers via evidence -based courses on social work, community organization, human trafficking prevention and interventions, and individualized coaching.
- Created the first International Human Trafficking & Social Justice Conference which has hosted representatives from 50 states and 60 countries with thousands in attendance for 20 consecutive years.



Meet Dr. Ceila Williamson: Her Impact

- 1993 Founded Second Chance, the first anti-trafficking program in Ohio
- 2002 Recipient of federal funding by the
 Department of Justice and/or National Institutes of Health to conduct research in human trafficking and its affects on wellbeing.
- 2004 Founded the annual International
 Human Trafficking & Social Justice
 Conference
- **2009 Founded** Lucas County Human Trafficking Coalition
 - Inducted into the Ohio Women's Hall of Fame for her work on sex trafficking and prostitution issues throughout Ohio
 - Second Chance received the FBI Director's Community Leadership Award for its efforts
- **2010** Gathered relevant data and worked with politicians to enable the first antitrafficking law in Ohio to be passed
- Provided research findings to support the need to pass an anti-human trafficking Safe Harbor Law in Ohio
- 2013 Chaired the Research & Analysis
 Subcommittee for the Ohio Attorney
 General's Human Trafficking
 Commission
 - An editorial manager for the Journal of Human Trafficking

- 2014 Provided data used to pass the first Demand Act in Ohio to hold customers of victims of human trafficking accountable.
 - Named 26th most influential social worker alive today by Social Work Degree Guide
- 2015 Opened the Human Trafficking and Social Justice Institute to advance the mission of combating human trafficking and supporting victims of this crime through research, education, and engagement
- 2018 Created Partners Against Trafficking in Humans (PATH), a community-wide coordinated, accountable, transparent service delivery system for survivors of human trafficking
 - Created a statistically valid screening to identify trafficked youth and those at risk
- Founding member and president of the Global Association of Human Trafficking Scholars (GAHTS)
- **2020 Formally established**Emancipation Nation
 - Founded the Emancipation Nation Network
 - Started the Emancipation Nation Podcast
- **2022 Became** a member of the G100, serving as one of the global 100 women changing the world and serves as the global wing against human trafficking.
- 2023 Awarded an Honorary Doctorate for Social Justice from Jharkhand Rai University



Meet Dr. Ceila Williamson: Her Impact



Celia Williamson, Ph.D., currently teaches social work practices and human trafficking courses, produces the Emancipation Nation podcast with over 200 episodes, and is the founder and lead facilitator of a global network of advocates called the Emancipation Nation Network, with over 20,000 members and growing.

Through her work she has influenced numerous laws, programs and policies related to human trafficking world-wide.

Emancipation Nation started with Williamson taking to the street in her home town, Toledo, Ohio, after losing friends to human trafficking. Every day, when she drove to work, she would see women on the street involved in prostitution and was determined to help them. She started by building relationships, interviewing women, and immersing herself in street culture. After six months, she created the first direct service antitrafficking program in Ohio with initial funding from the United Methodist Church and the City of Toledo.

Williamson went on to conduct street outreach on the streets of Toledo and in jails, facilitated groups, and advocated for women and youth. This work allowed her to win grants and bring funding to the Toledo community to provide programs and services for sex trafficking victims.

She went on to pursue her Ph.D. and returned to the Toledo community to build a thriving anti-trafficking coalition.

 Our 30 years of experience and best practice strategies are offered as a certification program where we train individuals the formula that has been working to help survivors heal and prevent high-risk individuals from becoming victims.


Our certification program:

- Asynchronistic, however, we have trained large groups within institutions synchronistically.
- 12 18 months of training, approximately 6 hours per week commitment
- Theory and practical training with assigned experiential homework
- Offers Continuing Education Credits and a Certificate at the end of completion, and the opportunity to work as a Certified Facilitator through Emancipation Nation Network
- At the end of the Certification, Certified Facilitators can competently fight for survivors' human rights, inform local policies, support victims and survivors, advocate for human rights and social justice, and create pathways to grow awareness of the underlying issues.

High-Risk Populations vs. The Global Problem Why Does This Matter?

There comes a point where we need to stop just pulling people out of the river.
We need to go upstream and find out why they're falling in."

— Desmond Tutu

Currently there is a lot of awareness about human trafficking, and it is evident that this is a global problem. However, this awareness masks the root issue.

To create change we must understand that there are specific populations who are at high risk of being trafficked, and focus our efforts there to drive maximum impact.

THIS HIGH-RISK POPULATION ACCOUNTS FOR MORE THAN 80% OF TRAFFICKED VICTIMS.¹

High-Risk Populations vs. The Global Problem Why Does This Matter?

THREAT + VULNERABILITY = RISK

THREAT

Being exposed to a person, people, or environment which increases the probability of danger. This could be someone inside the family, a friend(s), or someone outside of the family who is able to get close enough to the intended victim to manipulate, force, coerce, fraud, or otherwise deceive someone to gain their confidence.

VULNERABILITY

Someone who is at higher risk of becoming a victim due to their past experiences, level of instability, decreased protective and increased risk factors, and/or life situation (LGBTQ+, BIPOC, runaways, people with disabilities, and other marginalized populations.



High-Risk Populations vs. The Global Problem

AS IS USUALLY THE CASE, IT IS THOSE WHO ARE ALREADY IN SITUATIONS OF GREATEST VULNERABILITY

— including the poor and marginalized, workers in the informal economy, irregular or otherwise unprotected workers, and people subject to oppression and discrimination — who are most affected.

Even though this is a centuries -old problem for humanity, the severity is growing due to compounding crises such as the COVID-19 pandemic, armed conflicts, mass migration, illegal immigration, and climate change.⁷

This has led to unprecedented disruption to employment and education, increases in extreme poverty and forced and unsafe migration, and an upsurge in reports of gender-based violence, together serving to heighten the risk of all forms of human trafficking.⁷
